<u>Objective</u>: Learn to think in a manner consistent with the existence of scarcity, with special emphasis on consumer behavior: utility, budgets, and preferences; elasticity; and firm behavior: production, costs, competition, and monopoly

<u>Celebrations of Learning, Home Excitements, and Math Checkpoint</u>: There will be three in-term Celebrations of Learning and one final Ultimate Celebration of Learning, which will account for 80% of your grade. The weights are as follows:

These Celebrations of Learning will consist of multiple-choice and short answer questions. All Celebrations of Learning will be cumulative and comprehensive, with emphasis placed on the material presented after the previous Celebration of Learning. The use of calculators is prohibited.

No make-ups for the in-term Celebrations of Learning will be given. If you miss one in-term Celebration of Learning, its weight will automatically shift to the other Celebrations of Learning (including the Ultimate Celebration of Learning), at no penalty to you. No Celebration of Learning grades will be dropped. If you choose to take a Celebration of Learning, the grade you receive will become part of your average for the class. If you miss more than one in-term Celebration of Learning, I reserve the right to either give you a zero on one or both missed Celebrations of Learning, or require additional work from you.

<u>Home Excitements</u> (**HE**) will consist of the remaining 15% of your grade and will be due on the dates listed on the calendar. These assignments will consist of essay and short answer questions that reinforce the topics discussed in class. Home Excitements can be done alone or in groups of up to four. If a group works on the Home Excitement together, only *one Home Excitement* should be turned in for the individual group members. This way everyone in the group will receive exactly the same grade for the assignment. Absolutely **NO** late Home Excitements will be accepted.
